

COVID-19 Communications messages/activity report – 31 December 2020

Re: Clinically Extremely Vulnerable (CEV) residents

[Tier 4 Government guidance](#) came into force in Warwickshire on 31 December. The guidance places a number of restrictions on residents to stay home in order to limit their social interactions and the potential for the virus to spread.

The Government has identified and written to around 21,000 people in Warwickshire who are clinically extremely vulnerable to COVID-19 and they are strongly advised to take additional precautions by following Government shielding guidance. This may leave vulnerable residents isolated and cut off from support so the council is reaching out to them, and those who work with them, to remind them of guidance and help available from councils and partners at this time.

1. Direct communication to CEV adults

The following SMS text and email messages have been sent to c.16,500 residents on 31st December. A letter will be sent to the remaining c.4,000 in the first week in January.

SMS text message:

Following the announcement that we are now in Tier 4 lockdown the Government has asked Warwickshire County Council and [district & borough council name] to contact all Warwickshire residents who have been classified as being Clinically Extremely Vulnerable (CEV) and advise that we are here to help you to stay at home and avoid contact with others as much as possible. We can help if you need any information, advice, access to library services, support to access food, medicines, shopping or just a friendly voice if you are isolated or lonely. Warwickshire is in Tier 4

The UK Chief Medical Officers have issued a [statement on schools and childcare reopening](#) which states that there is a very low rate of severe disease in children and young people from COVID-19. Schools have their own measures in place to limit the risk of transmission which can be found in [guidance on reopening of schools](#).

The government has recently identified and written to a small number of Warwickshire pupils and students who are clinically extremely vulnerable to COVID-19. As Warwickshire is currently in Tier 4, these children and young people are advised to follow Government shielding advice and not to attend school. If their parents or carers are clinically extremely vulnerable they can continue to go to school.

People are advised to discuss their specific circumstances with their GP or other medical professional responsible for their care if they have queries about being identified as clinically extremely vulnerable.

4. CEV message to employers – news release – 31 December

Warwickshire businesses and organisations are asked to support their clinically extremely vulnerable employees

Following the announcement that Warwickshire entered into the new Tier 4 restrictions on the 31 December, those people identified as clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV) have been advised to avoid contact with others as much as possible. This means that they are strongly advised to work from home and, if that is not possible, then they should not attend work.

For those Warwickshire businesses and organisations who have CEV employees, they are being asked to speak to their staff as soon as possible about the new guidance and to make arrangements for them to work at home. If employees cannot work from home, then employers should consider whether their CEV employees will be eligible for the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme (furlough), which has been extended until 30 April 2021. Employees may also be eligible for Statutory Sick Pay (SSP) or Employment and Support Allowance (ESA), to support them to stay at home and follow the guidance.

Employees who are identified as being CEV will receive a letter which advises them to shield, which can act as evidence for their eligibility for SSP or ESA. Employers should be aware that some may not receive their letter until the first week in January but, in the meantime, they are being asked to support their CEV employees to stay at home whilst waiting for this to arrive.

Warwickshire County Councillor Les Caborn, Portfolio Holder for Adult Social Care and Health, said: "These measures are really hard for individuals, employers and whole communities but they are necessary to keep people as safe as possible. We must do all we can to help people who are clinically extremely vulnerable and at very high risk of severe illness from COVID-19 to follow government advice: to stay at home as much as possible and access the support they need to do so."
