### District & County Councillor's report for Henley in Arden JPC Meeting 3rd March 2025

**Merger of Stratford District Council with Warwickshire County Council** – There was a delay in announcing who would be in the first wave of unitaries, but we eventually heard that SDC and Warwickshire were not in the first wave of local authorities to become a unitary authority. Most of those that are in the first wave are from the south, these being

- East Sussex and West Sussex
- Essex and Thurrock
- Hampshire and the Isle of White
- Norfolk and Suffolk

It is likely that many more will be selected next year, and, in the meantime, we have been told to submit our first outline plan by the 21<sup>st</sup> March 2025 and a detailed plan by November 2025.

It is obvious that not all of the districts and boroughs want to remain as part of Warwickshire with the Lib Dems at Stratford and the Greens at Warwick preferring a north Warwickshire and a South Warwickshire unitary and are relying on the fact that the Devolution White Paper says that in exceptional circumstances that this will be allowed but it is also clear that the ideal size is at least on with 500,000 residents. Therefore, they do not and are unlikely to qualify or be allowed to go ahead. This split would not serve the residents well because all services in Warwickshire are delivered locally and get the benefit of economies of scale. Unpicking Adult Social care, Children's Care, Home 2 School transport, SEND, The Fire Service and Pensions funds would be costly and only benefit the politicians who seek to remain in control of an authority.

Interestingly The Lib Dems, Greens, Labour, the independents at County all voted last week to try and preserve Warwickshire identity as whole, despite representations at the meeting from the districts and boroughs.

My own view is that we have to find the best solution for the residents of Warwickshire, and I want to preserve Warwickshire as a County, I am proud to live in Warwickshire and I don't want us to be subsumed into another authority. Warwickshire has over 600,000 residents and therefor is the governments ideal size.

The debates at both SDC and County reflected the split between those who want the best for Warwickshire residents by creating a new unitary council using the 5 Districts and boroughs and County as the basis and those that are saying they can get a better outcome by merging with another authority without providing any evidence of who that would be with and why it would be a better fit.

I have volunteered to be on the working group that works up the outline case by 21st March 2025 as I am fascinated by this and honestly believe that our residents will be better served by a Warwickshire unitary.

As a final thought on this, it should be remembered that a new Warwickshire unitary would be created, not that Warwickshire County Council would take over. This is a chance to build a new organisation using the best practices and people from all the 5 districts and boroughs and the County, rationalising the systems and getting even better value for money for our residents.

I will update you next month on progress.

Council tax — At a full council meeting it was agreed that the County Council would increase the County Council tax burden on residents by 4.99% (2.99% general increase plus 1.99% ringfenced for Adult Social Care) — It is clear that all local authorities are under financial pressure especially upper tier authorities such as the county council due to increased costs caused in part by the increase in National Insurance and the greater demand on adult social care (ASC) services. ASC, Children's care, Home to school transport and special education needs and disabilities (SEND) costs account for around 70% of expenditure. Unfortunately, the government have decided to await the publication of yet another report which is not due until 2028. Many authorities are struggling with costs and have taken advantage of what is known as the Statutory Over ride. This is where over spending is carried forward into the next financial year, effectively making a local authority look solvent when it's

not. The government have no solution to this issue currently so the overspends may continue until the money runs out and local authorities actively declare themselves bankrupt (known as a s114 notice).

#### **County News**

**Property Flood Resilience Grant -** Following widespread flooding from Storm Henk in January 2024, Ministers activated the Flood Recovery Framework to provide support to those affected. One of the schemes within this framework is the Property Flood Resilience (PFR) Grant that allows eligible residents to claim back for up to £5,000 of improvement works to their properties that will make them more resilient to flooding. The closing date for new applications is approaching on Monday 31st March 2025 and to ask for you to encourage any eligible residents from your parish that you are aware of to come forward and contact the Flood Risk Management team on stormhenkpfrgrant@warwickshire.gov.uk before it is too late.

# Eligible residents are those that suffered internal property flooding during Storm Henk (2nd to 12th Jan 2024.)

Whilst the Flood Risk Management team have twice written out to the 106 eligible properties that they are aware of, uptake remains lower than hoped. A further letter detailing the closing date will be sent out in the coming days, alongside a post on the WCC social media pages.

**Warwickshire says NO MORE silence for victims of Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence - No More Week 2025 -** Warwickshire County Council (WCC) and its partners are supporting NO More Week (2-8 March) to help shine a spotlight on help and support for victim-survivors of Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence. It is estimated that domestic abuse impacts \*1 in 3 women and 1 in 6 men, and sexual violence impacts \*\*1 in 4 women and 1 in 18 for men. Domestic abuse or sexual violence can affect anyone regardless of gender, sexual orientation, faith, age or disability.

For many victim-survivors, silence is a way of life when living with a perpetrator. Abuse can take many forms that includes:

- Physical Abuse: This includes physical harm such as hitting, punching, kicking and strangulation.
- Emotional Abuse: This involves actions that harm a person's self-worth or emotional well-being, such as name-calling, shaming, humiliation, and isolation.
- Psychological Abuse (Coercive control): This includes controlling behaviour and stalking, threats and intimidation.
- Financial Abuse: This involves controlling a person's financial resources, restricting access to money, or preventing them from working.
- Sexual Abuse: This is any non-consensual sexual activity, which includes rape and forced sex acts.
- Technological Abuse: This includes monitoring online activities, cyberbullying and distributing explicit photos or videos, without consent.

Victim-survivor's voices should be heard and used as a basis for change. In early 2025, Warwickshire County Council and its partners launched its Safe Accommodation Strategy. Victim survivors are reminded that You Are Not Alone. ### Applications are now being taken for Warwickshire County Council's Induction Accelerator

**Fund -** Warwickshire businesses can benefit from a new fund from Warwickshire County Council's Skills Hub to enable them to induct new employees or apprentices into sustainable and net zero focused roles. - In response to business outlining some of the challenges they face when creating such roles, the Warwickshire Skills Hub, supported by the counites Districts and Boroughs, has created a programme of funding which will specifically support Warwickshire businesses to shape an in-depth induction offer. The offer includes bespoke wrap around support, training and mentoring, something businesses have stated is a huge need when supporting new recruits to acquire the right tools to be effective in their new role. The programme, funded by UKSPF, can offer up to £1000 of support to individuals who are new to the industry (such as apprentices or individuals who were previously unemployed) and entering into a role which is considered to be sustainable or support the businesses to work towards net zero ambitions as per the below.

Induction Accelerator Fund for apprentices – Businesses who recruit an apprentice or individuals who are unemployed into new and emerging technologies such as Vehicle Electrification, Battery Technology, Digital Skills or a standard that supports the Net Zero and Sustainability agenda, can apply to the fund for £1,000 salary support. This is capped at 5 people per business and the apprenticeship must begin prior to 15th March 2025.

Induction Accelerator Fund for new employees – Businesses who recruit a new employee who may have been previously unemployed (in the last 6 months) into new and emerging technologies such as Vehicle Electrification, Battery Technology, Digital Skills or a standard that supports the Net Zero and Sustainability agenda, can apply to this fund for £1,000 salary support. This is capped at 5 people per business and employment must begin prior to 15th March 2025.

The Warwickshire Skills Hub and their Future Skills Business Skills Support Advisors are on hand to support businesses to design the support needed in order to build effective induction and onboarding programmes.

**Warwickshire County Council Makes Strides Towards Net Zero** - Warwickshire County Council (WCC) has reaffirmed its commitment to tackling climate change with the publication of its first Sustainable Futures Annual Report 2024. The report highlights significant progress in reducing carbon emissions, improving climate resilience, and driving sustainability initiatives across the county. The Annual Report highlights that WCC has cut carbon emissions by 10% in 2023/24, with notable reductions in electricity usage (-24%), streetlighting (-17%), and business travel (-26%).

WCC aims to achieve net zero emissions for its operations by 2030 and support Warwickshire in reaching net zero by 2050. While great progress has been made, further action is needed to meet the ambitious goals.

Residents and businesses can support Warwickshire's net zero ambitions by:

- Reducing energy use at home and work.
- Using public transport or active travel options.
- · Reducing and recycling waste, including reusing or repairing items where possible

Warwickshire Registration and Libraries services introduce new library membership opportunity for babies - Parents and carers of newborns across the county will be offered a new opportunity to register their baby for a free library membership thanks to Warwickshire County Council's Libraries service and Registration service.

As part of a birth registration appointment currently in Warwickshire, Registrars gift BookTrust's Bookstart packs to new parents. These contain useful information about the benefits of reading books and sharing stories with their new baby from 0-12 months and include a free book and finger puppet to help parents get started.

In addition, Warwickshire Registration Services, in partnership with Warwickshire Libraries, offer parents the opportunity to signup for a free library membership at the same time, both for themselves and their newborn, at the birth registration appointment. Warwickshire Libraries have books suitable for parents to borrow and read to their babies in-person at a local library, to find through the online library catalogue, or by browsing the BorrowBox collection which includes a great range of eBooks and eAudiobooks. Babies listen to their parents' voices even before they're born, and so reading to them after they are born can be very comforting to hear these familiar voices and sounds. Reading together, even just a few words or talking about pictures in books, can help families to bond, develop babies' social, language and learning skills, and help establish a good bedtime routine. Warwickshire Libraries also deliver welcoming baby-friendly activity sessions. These include *Rhyme Time* with songs, rhyming words, and the opportunity for parents and carers to meet each other, along with *Dad and Me* sessions at Atherstone Library, which are sing-along-sessions for dads, grandads, and male carers. Warwickshire parents and carers with children moving to Secondary School will have received their school offer on Monday 3 March - Warwickshire parents and carers who have applied for a Year 7 secondary school place starting in September will get their child's offer of a school place on National Offer Day (Monday 3 March). Just like last year, Warwickshire County Council will automatically accept school place offers on behalf of each family. This means that parents and carers don't need to take any additional action but instead need to wait to hear from their new school. On Monday 3 March, parents and carers can log onto our Parent Portal to see what school they have been offered, and, with the vast majority of families usually satisfied with this offer, we will automatically accept the place on their behalf. This way, parents and carers have less work to do, and it allows our admissions team to focus more of their time on placing children in schools." On receipt of their school place offer, only those families who want to decline the offer of a school place need to contact the Admissions team. Details on how to do this will be included in their offer letter. Those families waiting for a Reception or Year 3 Junior School place will receive their school place offers on 16 April.
